# Lesson Plan

## Class: EF

<u>Topic of Unit:</u> Poetry in the Present: Modern Era, Readings and Poems in Social Media / Writing poems: Creative Writing - Instagram Poems

<u>Main Objectives of Lesson:</u> Students improve their text- and media competence by working with an instagram poem ("Fingers by Rupi Kaur") and then creating their own poem ("Die Schülerinnen und Schüler produzieren eigene kreative Texte" KLP: 20)

Warm-up / lead-in	Emoji-Tabu ( A should paraphrase Partner B (and the other way round) the given emoji by telling him/her in which contexts this emoji can be used or by using words other than the name for the emoji  -> After guessing both emojis (right), partner A & B should talk about whether both emojis can be used in the same or in different contexts  Why use emoji cards?  Since we are talking about Instagram poems we wanted to refer to the aspect of social media by handing out different emojis which can also be used on Instagram.  We decided on emojis with fingers only because we wanted to draw a reference to the poem "Fingers" which we will discuss later on. 
# Planned units on "Poetry"


# Poem:



## How to become an Instagram poet

Step-by-step guide on how to create your own poem

#### 1. Inspiration

- think about your last dream, your last encounter with a stranger, your last conversation or your latest wish you have fulfilled
- try to think of visual depictions, sounds, feelings and smells be inspired by all your senses

### 2. Topic

- find a topic you want to write about in your poem
- possible topics might be: positivity, togetherness, jealousy, rest, healing, breaking, loving, blooming, home & trust
  - → a poet can write about anything ②
- then start brainstorming and create a mindmap with words that come to your mind and which you associate with your chosen topic
- such as Rupi Kaur, you can implement illustrations and colors in your mindmap that might help you express your thoughts and feelings

#### 3. Form and Structure

- decide on a meter (e.g., little elevens, sonnet, rhyme scheme [aabb, abab, abba etc.])
- in case you decided to follow a rhyme scheme, expand your brainstorming mindmap by adding words that rhyme
- feel encouraged to try out different styles

#### 4. Freedom in Creativity

- writing poems is not about forming perfect sentences with a consistent structure
- instead, poems should reflect the poet's thoughts and emotions which might not be clear and comprehensible at first, but rather honest impressions

#### 5. Revision

- after writing your poem take your time to review your work
- you might delete superfluous words that disrupt the rhythm
- lastly, feel encouraged to read your poem aloud to hear what it sounds like

don't forget: writing poetry requires practice and experimentation (1)
